Around the Square

House Update

The House on Wednesday passed four bills and swore in a new member. Among these bills was the industrial commissions two-year budget. The commission will have \$51.4 million in FY 2018 and \$52.2 million in FY 2019. Other bills passed include House Bill 118, which prohibits the dismissal of a property tax complaint for inability to identify the property owner, and HB 101, which improves access to the generic version of EpiPens. The House Democratic caucus also unanimously approved Tavia Galonski to replace former Rep. Greta Johnson. Rep. Galonski, a former Summit County Juvenile Court magistrate, was sworn in by her uncle, Judge Randolph Baxter.

Senate Update

The Senate began finance subcommittee meetings to go over provisions in the biennial budget this week. Senate President Larry Obhof in a press release announced a schedule for the budget hearings with an expected vote date of June 22nd. The Senate Judiciary committee this week unanimously reported Senate Bill 4, which expands the list of expunge able offenses for human trafficking victims.

ECOT Rally

The Electronic Classroom of Tomorrow founder Bill Lager rallied on the statehouse steps on Tuesday to voice his concern over how e-schools have been treated in Ohio. The Department of Education and ECOT are currently in a lawsuit over ODE saying e-schools must show students are logging in to participate in 920 hours of learning opportunities each year. After winning the initial suit, ECOT is currently attempting to get the decision overturned in an appeals court.
