Budget Update

After passing the House last week, the two-year spending bill is entering its second week of hearings in Senate committees. Hearings have occurred in Senate Primary and Secondary Education, Senate Local Government and Elections, Senate Health, Senate General Government Budget, and Senate Workforce and Higher Education Committees. The upper chamber plans to start accepting amendments the week of May 10th, and plans for passage in early June, according to Senate President Matt Huffman.

Senate Passes COVID Relief Bill; Broadband Expansion

During Wednesday's Senate Session, legislators passed HB 167, a bill which authorizes \$565 million in COVID-19 housing support. The measure allows for \$465 million in FY 2021 to the Development Services Agency for an emergency rental assistance program, and \$100 million to the Department of Public Safety for COVID-19 relief. HB 167 now heads to the Governor for signature. The Senate also passed HB 2, which creates a Residential Broadband Expansion Grant Program to help develop infrastructure challenges. The measure provides immediate funding of \$20 million to launch the program in FY 2021. The bill picked up an amendment the day before in the Senate Financial Institutions and Technology Committee which removed funding for FY 2022-23. Senators plan to address funding in the state operating budget. The bill is now slated for a House concurrence vote.

Ohio to Lose Congressional Seat

Following Census results released this Monday, Ohio's U.S. House delegation will lose one seat, dropping from 16 to 15 members due to Ohio's 2% population growth rate falling below the nationwide rate of 7.4%. Seven states total have lost a seat, and six states will gain at least one seat. Additional redistricting data will be released by September 30th according to US Commerce Secretary Gina Raimondo. Following this delay, Ohio Senate President Matt Huffman has brought forth a plan to amend the Ohio Constitution to provide a more lenient redistricting schedule. At this time, the Redistricting Commission is required to adopt a new redistricting plan via a bipartisan vote in September. The proposal from President Huffman would push this date back to November.

Bill Introductions

- SB 169 Vaccination Prohibition (Brenner, A.): To prohibit mandatory vaccinations against the coronavirus, to prohibit requiring proof of vaccinations generally, and to declare an emergency.
- SB 170 Date Designation (Antani, N.): To designate May 21st as "Ohio Day for Cultural Diversity for Dialogue and Development."
- SB 171 Brine Sales (Hoagland, F., Rulli, M.): To establish conditions and requirements for the sale of brine from oil or gas operations as a commodity and to exempt that commodity from requirements otherwise applicable to brine.
- HB 273 Consumers' Counsel (O'Brien, M.): To remove the prohibition on the Office of the Consumers' Counsel operating a call center and to make an appropriation.
- HB 274 Firearms (Upchurch, T., Jarrells, D.): To restore local authority to generally regulate firearms-related conduct.
- HB 275 Political Subdivision (Lampton, B.): To expand political subdivision joint purchasing authority to expressly include purchases for construction services.
- HB 276 Prostitution (Powell, J., Schmidt, J.): To prohibit a person from receiving proceeds of prostitution.
- HB 277 Cosmetologists / Barbers (Powell, J.): To revise the law governing the regulation of cosmetologists and barbers.
- HB 278 MARCS (Hillyer, B.): To make changes to laws governing the multi-agency radio communications system (MARCS).
